# Submission Template for the 2017OBTC Teaching Conference for Management Educators

### 1) Title, Abstract & Keywords

#### Information Technology and Andragogy: Making them work together

KeyWords: Information Technology; Andragogy; Critical Thinking

Information technology is such a powerful tool there is danger that we will unwittingly distort our teaching to fit its strengths rather than use it to enhance our teaching effectiveness. It is important to evaluate technology for its impact on educational goals. A set of evaluation criteria will be presented based on the goal of teaching students to think critically about organizational behavior. The methods of andragogy are used as a guide to best practices to achieve this goal. Examples of class room practice will be presented followed by an interactive session to develop and exchange new ideas.

The learning objective is to enhance our ability to use information technology tools selectively in support of the broader goals of management education. The complex, multi-faceted nature of organizational behavior calls for students to think critically and challenge their assumptions about themselves and others. The practices of andragogy provide criteria more supportive of these goals than the pedagogical assumptions embedded in many on-line and software driven tools. Using selection criteria based on these practices will help us to select tools that support rather than impede our progress.
