Title: Set Sail with a Live Case

Abstract:

Seeking an effective learning experience for your students? Come learn about a hybrid live case experience that positions students in a real-world dilemma and allows the attainment of course learning goals. Our hybrid live case featured an interactive presentation from a "real-world" expert speaker/animator and was complemented by a brief written case. The hybrid live case experience was created and designed by the course instructor, the expert animator (i.e., guest speaker) and a research team. This interactive session will involve a live case presentation experience as well as the introduction of a framework for implementing a live case assignment.

Historically, the case teaching method has been an integral pedagogy in business and management education. This session introduces an adaptation of the case teaching method, the hybrid live case. The hybrid live case offers an active and contemporary learning experience for participants to involve their students. This session will also allow participants to add another teaching tool to their portfolio in the spirit of continuous improvement. The session strongly endorses experiential exercises as a means to achieve student learning goals and objectives.

In this session, the focal organizational behavior topics are leadership, group and team dynamics. However, the hybrid live case situation may be applied to any OB topic including strategic organizational behavior, organizational development, diversity, motivation, and conflict.

<u>Learning Objectives</u>: Participants will be able to:

- 1. Understand the concept of a hybrid live case.
- 2. Recognize the various elements and facets in the construction of a hybrid live case assignment.
- 3. Potentially develop and implement a hybrid live case assignment.

4) Application to Conference theme:

How does your session fit with the overall OBTC theme of *Navigating the Changing Currents*?

A hybrid live class session facilitates the creation of an active and dynamic learning environment. Experts in management education argue that applied learning experiences result in the attainment of learning objectives such as critical thinking, analytical skills and interrogation of "real-world" dilemmas.

Trends in management education also posit that instructors should consider pedagogies that are effective across varied student learning styles. A hybrid live case includes both written and oral presentation components; thereby, making the case assignment accessible to students with several learning styles.

The hybrid live case assignment can serve as a forum for multiple topics in Organizational Behavior across the four levels of analysis: individual, group/team, organizational, and marketplace/environment. Our hybrid live case presentation focuses on leadership, group and team dynamics. Furthermore, we are in the idea generation stage of hybrid live case assignments that will focus on social identity in the workplace and disruptive innovation theory.

With respect to faculty, the hybrid live case affords instructors the opportunity to: 1) collaborate with a subject matter expert; 2) connect their teaching and scholarship and 3) employ an effective teaching tool.
